Creation – making, inventing or producing something

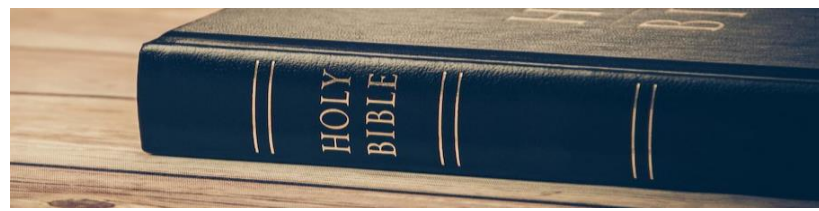
Creator – someone who makes, invents or produces something

Prayer – words spoken to God



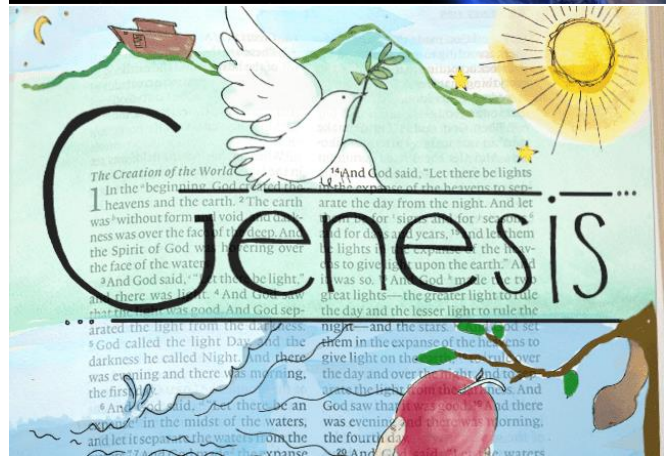

Judaism – the religion of Jewish people

Sin – an action which breaks a religious law

Forgiveness- to stop feeling bad against someone who has upset or hurt you

Atonement – Making up for something you've done wrong

Exodus – the second book of the Bible which tells of the Jews' escape from slavery in Egypt.



Passover 27th March – 4th April 2021
A celebration of spring, new life and escape from slavery.

Rosh Hashanah - 6th-8th September 2021
The Jewish new year.

Yom Kippur – 15th-16th September 2021
The holiest day of the Jewish calendar.

|  | ZAKAT | <i>Giving of alms, charity, to the poor 2.5% of income</i> |
|  | HAJJ | <i>Making pilgrimage to the House of Allah in Mecca</i> |
|  | FASTING | <i>Fasting sunrise to sunset during the Month of Ramadan</i> |

Ramadan – 12th April – 11th May 2021
The ninth month of the Islamic calendar.
Celebrates the revealing of the Quran

During Ramadan, muslims fast and help others who are less fortunate.

Key Vocabulary

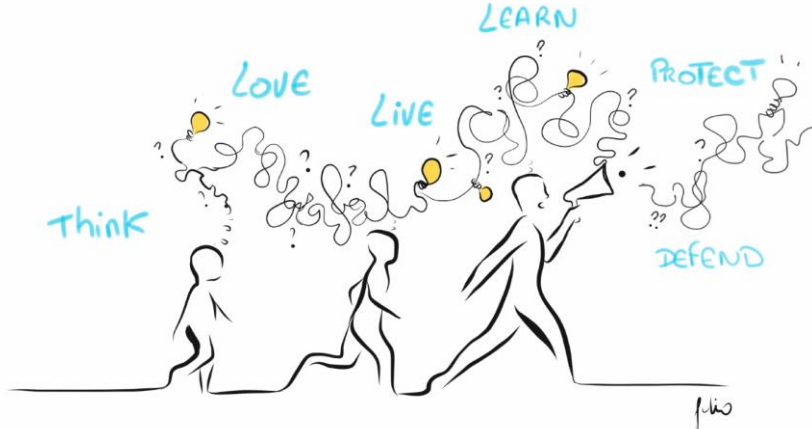
Commandments – a rule given by God
